Thanks to the Village of Kirkland for their donation of many village records which includes a Poll Book listing women who voted in the Village of Kirkland on April 20, 1920, the year in which women's voting rights began in the United States. In 1913, Illinois passed a bill to allow women to vote in national and local elections, but not in state elections. Following are the names of the women listed in the 1920 Kirkland Village Poll Book of Women Voters as voting:
